TOM TURNER

Tom Turner is a Librarian for the Patent and Trademark Resource Center Program. Tom joined the USPTO in 2001 having completed five years as the PTDL (PTRC) representative at Arizona State University's Noble Science and Engineering Library. At ASU, Tom held positions as engineering librarian, acting head of science reference, and patent/trademark librarian. From 1998 to 1999 he was the 16th Fellow to the PTRCP. Previously, he was the librarian for the Skidaway Institute of Oceanography in Savannah, Georgia from 1986 to 1996. Tom has given numerous presentations promoting PTRC services to librarians and inventor groups. He served on the editorial board for *Science & Technology Libraries* from 2002 to 2006.

Tom received the Department of Commerce Bronze Medal Award in 2013. He has a B.S. (Education) and an M.L.S. (Library Science), both from Louisiana State University. Tom is a current member of ALA. Tom retired from the USPTO in 2016 and returned in 2020. During his “retirement,” he worked for the Newseum and as a contractor for U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

The PTRC Program:

There are 83 public, academic, state, and special libraries designated as Patent and Trademark Resource Centers (PTRCs) throughout the United States. Library staff at these PTRC libraries provide information and training to the public about intellectual property concepts and research. Librarians meet with people from the community who may be at the beginning of their intellectual property journey, who may be advanced researchers, or who may need assistance with historical research. Librarians are there to meet the customer where they are at in their journey and our PTRC Program Office team is there to provide training and support to librarians on topics of intellectual property research.

Patent Public Search:

The new Patent Public Search tool launched on February 1, 2022 and is available on USPTO.gov. This new search tool is a convenient way to search three U.S. patent databases at once and has many features that new and regular patent searchers will appreciate. The new tool will replace legacy patent search tools PatFT, AppFT, PubEAST, and PubWEST as early as Q3 of FY2022 (estimated).
